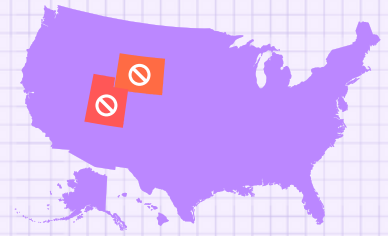


# SB23-109 IS EXTREME AND OUT OF STEP WITH COLORADO'S NEIGHBOR STATES.



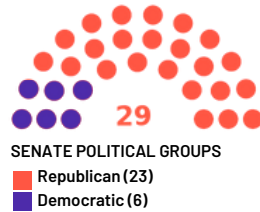

## FAILED

### Utah Bill [SB23-254](#): Drug Induced Homicide Amendments

Failed Senate 2nd reading

- 21-5 (3 excused)
- 4 Ds (all) voted no
- 17 Rs voted no



*"We appear to be absolving the person who is actually ingesting the drugs...and I'm concerned that we take a person who has no intent to kill and charg[e] them with murder."*

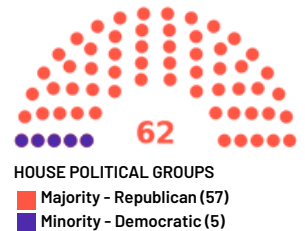

## FAILED

### Wyoming Bill [SF0181](#): Drug Induced Homicide

Failed House 3rd reading

- 38-23 (1 excused)
- 5 Ds (all) voted no
- 33 Rs voted no
